



Young David was a shepherd. Day by day he looked after his father's sheep in the fields around Bethlehem.


David must have been very brave. One day a fierce lion came and seized a lamb. What would David do?





He asked God to help him, and he killed the lion, and let the little lamb go free. Another time he fought and killed a bear. He knew that God had helped him to do it.

But one day was different from any other day. That morning he went out as usual in the fields with his father's sheep. But now what is happening?



Someone is running, telling him he must go quickly back home. He must have wondered why. Whatever was the matter?

There was his father—and his seven brothers—and an old man he had never seen before. They were all looking very serious.

But now the old man is stepping forward. He is pouring oil on David's head. We wonder if he told him that one day he will be the King of Israel. It must have been a shock to young David. Me? the king?

The old man was Samuel, God's prophet. God had sent him to find a new king instead of the bad King Saul, who now was king. As soon as Samuel saw David, God said, "This is he!"

It was a long, long time before David did become king. He went back into the fields, still looking after his sheep. He must have thought, though, of what it would be like—to be a real king with a crown? But he knew that one day it would come to pass. When God says something is going to happen, we know it will. David knew that.

David used to think of the way he looked after his sheep and cared for them. And he thought: that is just how God looks after His people. They are His sheep.

Do you know the lovely little Psalm, "The LORD is my Shepherd: I shall not want"?

You can read about this in 1 Samuel chapter 16, verses 1 to 13. Also Psalm 23.

A Psalm of David

The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want.

He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.

He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.

Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.

Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the LORD for ever.
